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This book is an educational work of true-crime history and behavioral analysis. It discusses stalking, intimate-partner violence, homicide, attempted assassination and other disturbing events. It is not legal, psychiatric, medical or personal-safety advice.

The word obsession is used as a descriptive theme, not as a diagnosis. Where motive is disputed, this edition distinguishes established facts, prosecution theories, court findings, offender claims and later interpretation. Mental illness, jealousy, rejection and intense attachment do not by themselves predict violence.

Victims are treated as people, not plot devices. Graphic details are limited to what is necessary to understand the investigation, evidence and legal outcome.

Introduction - Desire, Fixation and the Refusal to Accept No

Crimes of obsession are often told as stories of overwhelming emotion: love turned to hate, jealousy that exploded, a fan who went too far. Those phrases are memorable, but they can hide the most important evidence. Violence usually becomes understandable through behavior - repeated unwanted contact, surveillance, grievance, preparation, coercive control, weapon access and the refusal to accept another person's boundary.

This volume follows cases involving celebrity fixation, intimate relationships, stalking, divorce, affairs and post-separation violence. It also examines the research that changed how police, prosecutors and threat-assessment professionals understand fixation. The aim is not to diagnose offenders from a distance. It is to reconstruct patterns and ask which actions mattered before the crime.

A final principle runs through every chapter: obsession is not destiny. Most people who experience heartbreak, jealousy or intense attachment do not become violent. The warning signs that deserve attention are behaviors that can be observed, documented and assessed.
