PREFACE

Ancient Egypt has a peculiar power over the imagination. Its monuments are familiar enough to be cultural shorthand, yet strange enough to feel almost outside ordinary history. The pyramids rise from a desert plateau with a precision that still rewards measurement. Royal tombs descend into cliffs painted with maps of the afterlife. Temples preserve astronomical ceilings, medical texts, lists of kings and records of wars. Even after two centuries of modern Egyptology, new rooms, tombs and entire neighborhoods continue to emerge.

That does not mean Egypt is a civilization without explanations. Archaeology has answered an enormous number of questions. We know who commissioned the major pyramids, where much of the stone came from, how workers were organized, how religious institutions functioned, and how Egyptian writing changed across more than three thousand years. The surviving evidence is richer than the mythology that later grew around it.

The real mystery is more interesting. It lies in the boundary between what the evidence can establish and what it cannot. We can demonstrate that the Great Pyramid contains previously unknown voids, but not yet state their purpose. We can identify the makers of monumental stone coffers, while still admiring the logistical and technical challenge of producing them. We can explain the layered inscriptions at Abydos without pretending every visual coincidence is meaningless. And we can reject extraterrestrial explanations without diminishing the astonishing achievements of the people who actually built ancient Egypt.

This book therefore treats mystery as a question, not a conclusion. Each chapter separates established evidence from plausible interpretation and unsupported speculation. The goal is not to drain Egypt of wonder. It is to make the wonder harder to dismiss.
